

Subject: COVID19 Telehealth Program Funding Opportunity

Dear Colleague,

As you are aware, many HIV and PrEP clinical services have been converted to telehealth in response to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak in California.

As virtual clinical services may include costs that are not well covered with existing funding, we wanted to make you aware of a new funding opportunity available through the CARES Act to support the provision of telehealth in response to the COVID-19 pandemic (see details below).

COVID-19

The COVID-19 Telehealth Program will provide \$200 million in funding, appropriated by the (CARES) Act, to help healthcare providers provide connected **care services** to patients at their homes or mobile locations in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Is this a grant program?

No, the COVID-19 Telehealth Program is not a grant program. To receive disbursements, eligible health care providers that are approved for funding will be required to submit an invoicing form and supporting documentation in order to receive reimbursement for eligible expenses and services. Applicants who receive funding will be required to comply with all program rules and requirements, including applicable reporting requirements, and may be subject to compliance audits.

Who is eligible to receive funding?

The COVID-19 Telehealth Program is open to eligible health care provider sites that treat patients, whether located in rural or non-rural areas or U.S. territories. The COVID-19 Telehealth Program is limited to **nonprofit and public eligible health care providers** that fall within the categories of health care providers in section 254(h)(7) (B) of the 1996 Act:

- (1) post-secondary educational institutions offering health care instruction, teaching hospitals, and medical schools;
- (2) community health centers or health centers providing health care to migrants;
- (3) local health departments or agencies;
- (4) community mental health centers;
- (5) not-for-profit hospitals;
- (6) rural health clinics;
- (7) skilled nursing facilities; or
- (8) consortia of health care providers consisting of one or more entities falling into the first seven categories.

For purposes of the COVID-19 Telehealth Program, which is authorized by the <u>CARES Act</u>, and not the <u>1996 Telecommunications Act</u>, both rural and non-rural health clinics are eligible to receive funding.

1. ELIGIBLE SERVICES AND DEVICES

What services and connected devices are eligible for COVID-19 Telehealth Program funding?
 COVID-19 Telehealth Program funding will provide eligible health care providers support to purchase

telecommunications, information services, and connected devices necessary to provide <u>telehealth services to</u> <u>patients</u> in response to the coronavirus pandemic. Devices for which funding is requested must be integral to patient care.

The COVID-19 Telehealth Program will <u>only</u> fund devices (e.g., pulse oximetry, blood pressure monitoring devices, etc.) that are themselves connected, and <u>will not</u> fund unconnected devices that patients can use at home and then manually report the results to their medical professional. Connected devices may include devices with Bluetooth or WiFi connectivity, including devices that connect to a consumer's phone, for example.

Examples of eligible services and connected devices that COVID-19 Telehealth Program applicants may seek funding for include:

- Telecommunications Services and Broadband Connectivity Services: Voice services, for health care providers or their patients.
- Information Services: Internet connectivity services for health care providers or their patients; remote patient monitoring platforms and services; patient reported outcome platforms; store and forward services, such as asynchronous transfer of patient images and data for interpretation by a physician; platforms and services to provide synchronous video consultation.
- Connected Devices/Equipment: Tablets, smart phones, or connected devices to receive connected care services at home (e.g., broadband-enabled blood pressure monitors; pulse oximetry monitors) for patient or health care provider use; or telemedicine kiosks/carts for health care provider sites.

27. Are personnel, IT, administrative, and training costs eligible for support?

No. Funding will not be provided for personnel costs (including but not limited to costs for IT staff, project managers, or medical professionals), marketing costs, administrative expenses, or training costs. Vendors and service providers can elect to provide training and other IT support at no cost to health care providers participating in the program. Eligible health care providers should not include the cost of ineligible items in their funding application.

28. Will you fund the building of websites or the development of new platforms for providing connected care services?

No. Only eligible connected care services and devices may be funding by the COVID-19 Telehealth Program; the program is not intended to fund development of new websites, systems, or platforms.

All inspections are scheduled and in fact after 13 years we are quite often contacted by farm operations to set up times and dates for the inspections at either their yards or to ride along with them for stationary locations in the ag settings. After the 2007 Spinach outbreak industry auditors for major food chains and USDA look have looked for our stickers on FT's and note it for compliance for food safety. This is the reason farm operations call us prior to any audits.

The program has worked well over the years. Note that since 2007 we have not issued any fines or penalties as our Environmental Health Bureau stresses compliance and we work to get operations compliant for public health and safety.

This is an existing permit program for field toilets (FT's) initiated after Spinach outbreak in 2006, and we have a list of current operations with annual permits that we inspect each year. Inspections are scheduled with FT vendors/service providers and with Ag operations.

With the heightened concerns over COVID-19 we are stressing that Ag operations continue to ensure and possibly increase service and Maintaince of FT's during the year. We also experience many unpermitted contractors or farm operations who provide FT's that do not provide the items listed in my prior email to assure hygienic needs.

Our inspections incorporate state law under authority of the health officer and OSHA standards (referenced only). My main message in my prior email is to get the message out to Ag industry regarding those farm operations or contractors providing FT's who come from outside the area to work in the county. With the assistance of Ag operations we can then inspect these units to enhance all protective measures for all workers.

EH is in the process of beginning the permitting of Field Toilets for agricultural workers. The permit requires soap, water (for hand washing) as well as separate drinking water and paper towels. It also requires that units are clean and frequently maintained/serviced. We are also preparing information (English/Spanish) on social distancing, handwashing and wearing of face coverings to be posted adjacent to the units or inside to help educate farmworkers.

It is also important that Ag operations/farmers that utilize services from contractors who bring workers to harvest fields also employ these practices and have their Field Toilets permitted to assure all farmworkers are provided the same level of sanitary services while working.

Each unit inspected by EH is identified by a colored sticker that matches the current DMV registration sticker with our county information and year of the permit.

We are hopeful that any service provider is directed to EH to have each unit permitted and inspected to enhance the protections for farmworkers.

I found that where we left yesterday was an area where implementing public health risk mitigation strategies, where employees can be segregated into a "cohort" may provide an area for employers to both operate and do so as safe as is practicable to continue functioning while limiting the risk of transmission (and contraction).

My use of the term "beginning" inspections refers to our annual process of inspecting FT's in the county and there is a long standing process (since 2007) where we schedule annual inspections with owners of FT's as farmworkers begin returning to the county and Ag operations begin in March/April. The PDF in my last email outlines how we inspect. We are somewhat late due to COVID -19 shelter in place and staff availability.

We are hoping that farm operations are our eyes in the field and when they notice contractor buses hauling FT's without the current sticker showing they have been inspected that they inform them of the needs to have them permitted to protect workers. Farm operations can provide us names of operations and we will contact the contractors to schedule inspections. We focus on compliance to assure handwashing stations etc. are provided and maintained. Since the rollout of our program in 2007 we have not fined or penalized any one because we want compliance for public health and safety. We will do the same with any non-permitted operation and work with them to get them on board.

The goal is to ensure all FT's on any Ag site provide safe drinking water, water for handwashing, paper towels, soap, and sanitary conditions for FT's.

When the program began, we had many presentations to Ag operations, the FB, GSA and contractors. The program is well established, and we just want those outliers in line with worker safety needs during COVID -19 and it is another way for Ag to demonstrate to workers and the public that safety measures are in place to help stop the spread of the virus.

A few comments, if allowed:

• Many portable field toilets are from rental companies that are serviced exclusively by those companies, not the farm or harvest operation. How will it be distinguished on responsibility for supplies, sanitation, etc. ... this needs to be very clear up front or there will be finger pointing.

This is true and we are asking that if any FT is on any farm operation site that the farm operation ensures that the FT is permitted (inspected) to protect and provide service and maintenance for farmworker safety.

The requirement for permitting falls on the owner of the FT's not the farm operation.

• Drinking water is already a CalOSHA requirement and is provided in large coolers for each crew ... why the duplicate requirement? Do we have enough coolers in local area stores to supply a run on these coolers when the duplicate requirement is placed into effect? Seems like an unnecessary step and unneeded cost at this time of severe financial impacts.

This is not a duplicate requirement; you may be surprised to know when we rolled out the program in 2007, we documented many instances where no water was provided or that coolers were empty, no soap, no water for handwashing etc. (see attached PDF for reference). Note that this program was initiated after the Spinach outbreak in 2006.

We are only verifying coolers are available to workers and if not attached to the units that is ok also. What is important units have water during the day for handwashing not drinking. Also note since 2007 we have permitted thousands of FT's in the county and my message is to try to have unpermitted FT's on farm sites meet the same requirements for workers needs. By having all FT's on site permitted by the <u>owners</u> not the farm operations would ensure the FT's provide another level of protections for farmworkers and handwashing to reduce any threats of virus spreading.

This is an existing permit program for field toilets (FT's) initiated after Spinach outbreak in 2006, and we have a list of current operations with annual permits that we inspect each year. Inspections are scheduled with FT vendors/service providers and with Ag operations.

With the heightened concerns over COVID-19 we are stressing that Ag operations continue to ensure and possibly increase service and Maintaince of FT's during the year. We also experience many unpermitted contractors or farm operations who provide FT's that do not provide the items listed in my prior email to assure hygienic needs.

Our inspections incorporate state law under authority of the health officer and OSHA standards (referenced only). My main message in my prior email is to get the message out to Ag industry regarding those farm operations or contractors providing FT's who come from outside the area to work in the county. With the assistance of Ag operations we can then inspect these units to enhance all protective measures for all workers.

My use of the term "beginning" inspections refers to our annual process of inspecting FT's in the county and there is a long standing process (since 2007) where we schedule annual inspections with owners of FT's as farmworkers begin returning to the county and Ag operations begin in March/April. The PDF in my last email outlines how we inspect. We are somewhat late due to COVID -19 shelter in place and staff availability.

We are hoping that farm operations are our eyes in the field and when they notice contractor buses hauling FT's without the current sticker showing they have been inspected that they inform them of the needs to have them permitted to protect workers. Farm operations can provide us names of operations and we will contact the contractors to schedule inspections. We focus on compliance to assure handwashing stations etc. are provided and maintained. Since the rollout of our program in 2007 we have not fined or penalized any one because we want compliance for public health and safety. We will do the same with any non-permitted operation and work with them to get them on board.

The goal is to ensure all FT's on any Ag site provide safe drinking water, water for handwashing, paper towels, soap, and sanitary conditions for FT's.

When the program began, we had many presentations to Ag operations, the FB, GSA and contractors. The program is well established, and we just want those outliers in line with worker safety needs during COVID -19 and it is another way for Ag to demonstrate to workers and the public that safety measures are in place to help stop the spread of the virus.

A few comments, if allowed:

Many portable field toilets are from rental companies that are serviced exclusively by
those companies, not the farm or harvest operation. How will it be distinguished on
responsibility for supplies, sanitation, etc. ... this needs to be very clear up front or
there will be finger pointing.

This is true and we are asking that if any FT is on any farm operation site that the farm operation ensures that the FT is permitted (inspected) to protect and provide service and maintenance for farmworker safety.

The requirement for permitting falls on the owner of the FT's not the farm operation.

 Drinking water is already a CalOSHA requirement and is provided in large coolers for each crew ... why the duplicate requirement? Do we have enough coolers in local area stores to supply a run on these coolers when the duplicate requirement is placed into effect? Seems like an unnecessary step and unneeded cost at this time of severe financial impacts.

This is not a duplicate requirement; you may be surprised to know when we rolled out the program in 2007, we documented many instances where no water was provided or that coolers were empty, no soap, no water for handwashing etc. (see attached PDF for reference). Note that this program was initiated after the Spinach outbreak in 2006.

We are only verifying coolers are available to workers and if not attached to the units that is ok also.

What is important units have water during the day for handwashing not drinking. Also note since 2007 we have permitted thousands of FT's in the county and my message is to try to have unpermitted FT's on farm sites meet the same requirements for workers needs. By having all FT's on site permitted by the <u>owners</u> not the farm operations would ensure the FT's provide another level of protections for farmworkers and handwashing to reduce any threats of virus spreading.

EH is in the process of beginning the permitting of Field Toilets for agricultural workers. The permit requires soap, water (for hand washing) as well as separate drinking water and paper towels. It also requires that units are clean and frequently maintained/serviced. We are also preparing information (English/Spanish) on social distancing, handwashing and wearing of face coverings to be posted adjacent to the units or inside to help educate farmworkers.

It is also important that Ag operations/farmers that utilize services from contractors who bring workers to harvest fields also employ these practices and have their Field Toilets permitted to assure all farmworkers are provided the same level of sanitary services while working.

Each unit inspected by EH is identified by a colored sticker that matches the current DMV registration sticker with our county information and year of the permit.

We are hopeful that any service provider is directed to EH to have each unit permitted and inspected to enhance the protections for farmworkers.

Access to Healthcare

New CRLA Resource: Check out CRLA's COVID-19 Access to Healthcare in California video, available in <u>Spanish</u> and <u>Enalish</u> (and soon to be dialects of Mixteco and Triqui)!

- 1. All California health insurance plans are required to cover the *entire cost* coronavirus testing, and must provide coverage for treatment too.
 - a. This includes all Medi-Cal plans, even Medi-Cal plans that provide coverage to low-income California residents regardless of immigration status such as restricted-scope ("emergency") Medi-Cal coverage and the new COVID-19 Presumptive Eligibility Program. Even if someone is undocumented, they can still get coverage for the entire cost of testing and emergency treatment until after they are stabilized and no longer need emergency services.
- 2. COVID-19 related services will NOT harm someone's current or future immigration case (The new public charge rule will not consider testing and treatment for coronavirus, even if Medi-Cal pays for the testing and treatment).
- 3. If you do not have any health insurance at all right now, or lose coverage in the future because your work hours are reduced or you get laid off due to coronavirus, consider applying for a plan through:
 - a. Covered California, the marketplace for private health insurance that offers discounted plans;
 - b. Medi-Cal, the state's free or low-cost health insurance for low-income Californians;
 - c. Medicare, the federal health insurance program for those 65 and over or disabled; or
 - d. Federal COBRA and Cal-COBRA programs, which may allow some to people continue their employer-sponsored health care coverage when a job ends or hours are reduced.
- 4. Medi-Cal and Covered California have issued many policy changes to help Californians keep or get coverage. Among them:
 - a. All Medi-Cal redeterminations have been put on hold, meaning those who already have Medi-Cal are not currently at risk of their losing coverage.
 - b. Covered California has opened a new special enrollment period that will last through June for those experiencing job loss or reduced hours due to COVID-19.
- 5. California has created a new "Medi-Nurse" line available for uninsured Californians and Medi-Cal patients without a health plan (fee for service). The line 1-877-409-9052 is available 24/7 for COVID-19 concerns or for general medical issues. Those who have health insurance may visit covid19.ca.gov/telehealth/ to find their health insurance plan's telehealth and nurse help lines.

Work + Financial Security:

New CRLA Resource: <u>Check out CRLA's Guide to COVID-19 Replacement Income and Job-Protected Leave for California Workers</u> (available in Eng. and Span.).

Many California residents have lost work or experienced a reduction in hours because of coronavirus (COVID-19). Other Californians whose workplace is still open might need time off to care for themselves or a loved one. Many of these workers may be entitled to some time off for coronavirus-related absences, and/or eligible for some form of wage replacement while they are not working. Eligibility for job-protected leave and wage replacement benefits depends on the size of the employer, the work history of the employee, the reason the employee is seeking leave, and in some cases the employee's immigration status. CRLA's *Guide to COVID-19 Replacement Income and Job-Protected Leave for California Workers* provides an overview of the replacement income and job-protected leave programs available to California's workers, and can help orient workers to the programs that may be right for them.

Here is some info on a few other financial security programs:

- 1. <u>Disaster Relief Assistance for Immigrants Project</u>: The one-time disaster relief assistance to undocumented adult immigrants impacted by COVID-19, who are ineligible for most other forms of pandemic assistance, including direct assistance under the CARES Act and unemployment insurance.
 - a. This week the California Department of Social Services updated the program's website with additional information about eligibility criteria and released the list of 12 non-profit agencies that will be in charge of administering the funds (each agency has been assigned to assist one of California 8 regions). It is important to note that these agencies will not be accepting applications prior to May 18, 2020. Further, the assistance is on a first come first served basis so it is very likely that this money will go fast.
- 2. Economic Impact Payments (also referred to as stimulus payments): Provides direct payments on a sliding scale of up to \$1,200 per adult and \$500 per child, depending on income and immigration status.
 - a. Only those immigrants with legal permanent residency (i.e. a green card) or who are "resident aliens" will qualify (this includes people with Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and Temporary Protected Status (TPS)). Many people who meet these prerequisites will still be disqualified from receiving cash payments if they have a spouse or child who does not have a valid Social Security number (i.e. many mixed status families). Undocumented people are not eligible for these payments. More information available here and here.
- 3. Pandemic EBT (P-EBT): Due to Coronavirus (COVID-19), children who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals at school will get extra food benefits. These food benefits are called Pandemic EBT or P-EBT benefits. P-EBT benefits help families in California buy food when schools are closed because of the coronavirus emergency.
 - a. Families will get up to \$365 per eligible child on their P-EBT card to use on food and groceries. Families with children who get CalFresh, Medi-Cal or Foster Care benefits do not need to apply. Most will get their P-EBT card in the mail during the month of May. P-EBT cards will begin arriving around May 12, 2020. Families with children who are eligible for free or

reduced-price meals and who do not get their P-EBT card in the mail by about May 22, 2020 must apply online before June 30, 2020. The online application will be available beginning May 22, 2020 at ca.p-ebt.org.

For help with time off, replacement income programs, or other COVID-19 related work questions, workers can contact California Rural Legal Assistance in Monterey County at 831-757-5221 or in Santa Cruz County at 831-724-2253. See here for a full list of CRLA locations and contact information. This Legal Aid At Work FAQ has great information for workers and will be continuously updated as new information becomes available. The Employment Development Department's UI instructional videos, available in several languages, can provide helpful guidance to applicants. EDD's COVID-19 page also has pertinent information related to Disability Insurance and Paid Family Leave. The Center for Workers' Rights has a Spanish language webinar recording about Unemployment Insurance and COVID-19.

Housing:

New CRLA Resource: Check out CRLA's COVID-19 Housing Rights One-Pager (in Eng. And Span.). The COVID-19 Housing Rights One-Pager can be used anywhere in California.

The California Court system has issued emergency rules that suspend most evictions during shelter-in-place from April 6 until 90 days after the Governor lifts the state of emergency related to the COVID-19 pandemic or until the California Courts amend or repeal these new emergency rules (details below). These protections are in addition to (1) Governor Newsom's more narrow Executive Order banning the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19 through May 31, 2020; and (2) Local renter protections put in place by some California cities and counties. Renters who are not able to pay their rent or who have received notices of eviction should seek out legal assistance immediately.

- 1. The California Courts' Emergency Order effectively halts most evictions during the COVID-19 state of emergency unless allowing the case to proceed is "necessary to protect public health and safety." Here is a <u>brief analysis of the Order</u>. Unless allowing the case to proceed is "necessary to protect public health and safety":
 - 1. The courts may not issue a summons in any new eviction case (i.e. unlawful detainer case). This means that the even though a landlord has filed a new case in court to evict a tenant, the case may not proceed until these rules are lifted.
 - 2. For cases already past the initial step of a summons, courts may not enter judgment against a tenant for failure to appear in court. In addition, all trials are delayed for at *least* 60 days.
 - 3. The Superior Court of Monterey released an <u>FAQ</u> regarding its implementation of the Judicial Council's order. Of note is that relief (in the form of a stay of eviction) may be available to tenants who have already lost in court and received an order of eviction. (See Q-6 for more).
- 2. Governor Newsom has issued an <u>executive order</u> banning the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19 through May 31, 2020. It requires tenants to declare in writing, no more than seven days after the rent comes due, that the tenant cannot pay all or part of their rent due to COVID-19.
- 3. In addition to the new California Courts' Emergency Rules and the Governor's Executive Order, some California cities and counties have put in place local tenant protections. The terms of each specific local moratorium are different and may provide additional protections above and beyond the California Courts' rules and Governor Newsome's Executive Order.

CRLA locations and contact information. This <u>COVID-19 Renter's Guide</u> from Tenant's Together is also a valuable resource for renters.

Immigration:

- 1. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has released a <u>statement</u> describing its intention to "not carry out enforcement operations at or near health care facilities, such as hospitals, doctors' offices, accredited health clinics, and emergent or urgent care facilities, except in the most extraordinary of circumstances." The statement also says that "Individuals should not avoid seeking medical care because they fear civil immigration enforcement."
- 2. All non-detained hearings scheduled through May 29, 2020, have been postponed. At the San Francisco Detained Immigration Court, hearings are moving forward as scheduled. EOIR has created a website dedicated to immigration court updates. People can call the EOIR automated hotline (1 (800) 898-7180) and provide their "A" number and a recording will provide them with information about their case
- 3. All U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) field offices, asylum offices, and Application Support Centers (ASCs) will not provide in-person services (including interviews, naturalization ceremonies, and biometric collection appointments) until at least June 4, 2020. USCIS will continue to provide emergency services during this time. USCIS field offices will send de-scheduling notices to applicants and petitioners with scheduled appointments impacted by the closure. All applicants will be rescheduled when USCIS resumes normal operations. It is important to make sure USCIS has a current address on file.
- 4. ICE / ISAP Check-Ins: ISAP Officers should call to inform individuals that in-person check-ins are cancelled until further notice. If someone has not yet been contacted, they should consider calling their ISAP officer for more information.

On April 8th, California announced that restricted-scope Medi-Cal will cover all inpatient and outpatient COVID-19 related necessary treatments until after somebody is stabilized and no longer needs emergency services. Advocates are seeking further guidance with respect to restricted-scope Medi-Cal coverage for the continuation of medically necessary inpatient hospital services and follow up care after the emergency has resolved. California has submitted various waiver requests to the federal government to broaden the scope of Emergency services.
- 3. COVID-19 related services will NOT harm someone's current or future immigration case (The new public charge rule will not consider testing and treatment for coronavirus, even if Medi-Cal pays for the testing and treatment).
- 4. Covered California has opened a new special enrollment period that will last through June for those experiencing job loss or reduced hours due to COVID-19.
- 5. Medi-Cal has issued many policy changes to help Californians keep or get coverage. Among them, all redeterminations have been put on hold, meaning those who already have Medi-Cal are not currently at risk of their losing coverage.

Housing:

The California Court system has issued emergency rules that suspend most evictions during shelter-in-place from April 6 until 90 days after the Governor lifts the state of emergency related to the COVID-19 pandemic or until the California Courts amend or repeal these new emergency rules (details below). These protections are in addition to (1) Governor Newsom's more narrow Executive Order banning the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19 through May 31, 2020; and (2) Local renter protections put in place by some California cities and counties. Renters who are not able to pay their rent or who have received notices of eviction should seek out legal assistance immediately.

- 1. The California Courts' Emergency Order effectively halts most evictions during the COVID-19 state of emergency unless allowing the case to proceed is "necessary to protect public health and safety." Here is an in-depth analysis of the Order. Unless allowing the case to proceed is "necessary to protect public health and safety":
 - 1. The courts may not issue a summons in any new eviction case (i.e. unlawful detainer case). This means that the even though a landlord has filed a new case in court to evict a tenant, the case may not proceed until these rules are lifted.
 - 2. For cases already past the initial step of a summons, courts may not enter judgment against a tenant for failure to appear in court. In addition, all trials are delayed for at *least* 60 days.
 - 3. The Superior Court of Monterey released an <u>FAQ</u> regarding its implementation of the Judicial Council's order. Of note is that relief (in the form of a stay of eviction) may be available to tenants who have already lost in court and received an order of eviction. (See Q-6 for more).

- 2. Governor Newsom has issued an <u>executive order</u> banning the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19 through May 31, 2020. It requires tenants to declare in writing, no more than seven days after the rent comes due, that the tenant cannot pay all or part of their rent due to COVID-19.
- 3. In addition to the new California Courts' Emergency Rules and the Governor's Executive Order, some California cities and counties have put in place local tenant protections. The terms of each specific local moratorium are different and may provide additional protections above and beyond the California Courts' rules and Governor Newsome's Executive Order.

Immigration:

- 1. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has released a <u>statement</u> describing its intention to "not carry out enforcement operations at or near health care facilities, such as hospitals, doctors' offices, accredited health clinics, and emergent or urgent care facilities, except in the most extraordinary of circumstances." The statement also says that "Individuals should not avoid seeking medical care because they fear civil immigration enforcement."
- 2. All non-detained hearings scheduled through May 1, 2020, have been postponed. At the San Francisco Detained Immigration Court, hearings are moving forward as scheduled. People can call the EOIR automated hotline (1 (800) 898-7180) and provide their "A" number and a recording will provide them with information about their case.
- 1. All U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) field offices, asylum offices, and Application Support Centers (ASCs) will not provide in-person services (including interviews, naturalization ceremonies, and biometric collection appointments) until at least May 3. USCIS will continue to provide emergency services during this time. USCIS field offices will send de-scheduling notices to applicants and petitioners with scheduled appointments impacted by the closure. All applicants will be rescheduled when USCIS resumes normal operations. It is important to make sure USCIS has a current address on file.
- 2. ICE / ISAP Check-Ins: ISAP Officers should call to inform you that in-person check-ins are cancelled until further notice. If you have not yet been contacted, please call your ISAP officer for more information.

Subject: COVID-19 + Social Determinants of Health Update from CRLA MLP

Hi frontline providers, advocates, and friends,

In this challenging time, I draw hope and inspiration from this group of community leaders, healthcare workers, legal services providers, and dear friends as we band together to be there for our community in a time of need. As we all are working in our own ways to support our community and partners in response to COVID-19, I'm reaching out to share some information from the CRLA Medical-Legal Partnership (MLP) that you may find useful. We're doing our best to gather all the information we're receiving on social determinants of health (SDOH) in the areas of access to healthcare, work, housing, and immigration, and condense it into manageable talking points (with links to dig deeper and referral information).

Please see below for the first COVID-19 + SDOH update from CRLA's MLP. This information is not exhaustive and is tailored to Monterey County, where CRLA's MLP has the privilege of learning from and supporting patients and providers at the Monterey County Health Department. Much of this information is also applicable statewide. The information herein is for informational purposes only and does not constitute legal advice. Much of this information is taken directly from the important work our allies are doing to inform and advocate for the community and frontline workers. We are very grateful to them for their leadership in these difficult moments. While we are making every effort to ensure this information is accurate, due to rapidly changing policies and circumstances we will follow up with corrections as needed.

I will send around an update to this information on this email thread as needed (and I will try to limit updates to once a week). Any feedback about how to improve this update is welcome. Feel free to reach out to me to get clarification or correct any information in this email, or suggest additional information for the following update. You may share this email with anyone you'd like. If you would like to be taken off this email list, just reply to this email with the word stop. If you'd like to add someone to this email list, just reply to this email address.

I'd be lying if I said as wasn't scared about how COVID-19 will impact our families, friends, and communities. But I'm in awe of the hard work and sacrifice of those in our essential industries. I'm heartened by the many acts of kindness I've seen and read about. And I'm moved by the efforts of everyone on this thread and countless others to be there for one another in the face of these unprecedented challenges. I hope this information may be of use to you in that work.

COVID-19 + SDOH Update

Access to Healthcare

- 1. All public and commercial health insurance plans are required to cover the *entire cost* of coronavirus testing and screening.
- For those with restricted-scope Medi-Cal coverage, the entire cost of COVID-19 testing and screening
 will be covered. While the State of California has not yet confirmed that restricted-scope Medi-Cal
 will cover the entire cost of COVID-19 treatment, existing laws and policies indicate that the cost of
 treatment will be covered

- 3. COVID-19 related services will NOT harm someone's current or future immigration case (The new public charge rule will not consider testing and treatment for coronavirus, even if Medi-Cal pays for the testing and treatment).
- 4. Covered California has opened a new special enrollment period that will last through June for those experiencing job loss or reduced hours due to COVID-19.
- 5. Medi-Cal has issued many policy changes to help Californians keep or get coverage.

Work

- 1. Most workers will be entitled to some time off for coronavirus related absences, and eligible for wage-replacement programs while they are not working.
- 2. The federal government is passing legislation to help workers. More information will be available in the coming days and weeks.
 - a. The Families First Coronavirus Response Act gives eligible workers 2 weeks of additional Paid Sick Days. It also gives eligible workers an additional 12 weeks of job-protected, paid leave, at 2/3 their normal pay rate, up to \$200 per day. Not all workers are eligible for those benefits, in particular there are exceptions for some workers at large corporations (over 500 employees) and small businesses (under 50 employees). Summary here.
 - b. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), signed into law on March 27th, expanded unemployment insurance to provide increased benefits to more workers who are being furloughed, laid off, or finding themselves without work through no fault of their own because of the COVID-19 pandemic and our public health response to it. <u>Summary here</u>.
 - c. The CARES Act also will provide direct payments on a sliding scale of up to \$1,200 per adult and \$500 per child, depending on income and immigration status. Only those immigrants with legal permanent residency (i.e. a green card) or who are "resident aliens" will qualify (this includes people with Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and Temporary Protected Status (TPS)). Many people who meet these prerequisites will still be disqualified from receiving cash payments if they have a spouse or child who does not have a valid Social Security number (i.e. many mixed status families). Undocumented people are not eligible for these payments. Summary here.
- 3. For employer-initiated temporary work closures, workers may be eligible for unemployment insurance (but not undocumented workers).
- 4. For workers that take time to care for their own health, they may be eligible for State Disability Insurance (undocumented workers are eligible) and Paid Sick Leave.
- 5. For workers that take time off to care for a loved one, they may be eligible for Paid Family Leave (undocumented workers are eligible) and Paid Sick Leave.
- 6. For workers that contract COVID-19 during their regular course of work, they may be eligible for replacement income through workers' compensation.

Housing

- 1. Governor Newsom has issued an <u>executive order</u> banning the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19 through May 31, 2020. The order prohibits landlords from evicting tenants for nonpayment of rent and prohibits enforcement of evictions by law enforcement or courts. It requires tenants to declare in writing, no more than seven days after the rent comes due, that the tenant cannot pay all or part of their rent due to COVID-19.
- 2. In addition to the new statewide eviction moratorium, Monterey County passed an eviction moratorium for unincorporated areas on March 17th, but it does not include incorporated areas such as cities within the County. Seaside has also passed an eviction moratorium. Advocates are still gathering information as to any other cities in the County that have passed a moratorium. Santa Cruz County has also passed an eviction moratorium for unincorporated areas, and the city of Watsonville in Santa Cruz has passed one as well. The terms of each specific local moratorium are different and may provide additional protections above and beyond the statewide moratorium. Renters who have received notices of eviction should contact legal assistance immediately.
- 3. The Monterey County Superior Court is closed from March 18, 2020 through at least April 3, 2020. This will delay landlords in their attempts to evict tenants for any reason until at least April 3rd, and very possibly even longer.

The Sacramento Immigration Court (916-447-9301) is currently closed and all hearings have been postponed. People can call the EOIR automated hotline (1 (800) 898-7180) and provide their "A" number and a recording will provide them with information about their case.

All U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) field offices, asylum offices, and Application Support Centers (ASCs) will not provide in-person services (including interviews, naturalization ceremonies, and biometric collection appointments) until at least April 1. USCIS will continue to provide emergency services during this time. USCIS field offices will send de-scheduling notices to applicants and petitioners with scheduled appointments impacted by the closure. All applicants will be rescheduled when USCIS resumes normal operations. It is important to make sure USCIS has a current address on file.

Hi All,

Thank you for everything you're doing to be there for our community in our time of need! I can't imagine how hard you are all working right now. In spite of all of the challenges we are encountering, it's such a privilege to work alongside you all-- our nation's heroes!

I just wanted to let you all know that CRLA is committed to helping patients access all the healthcare coverage they can get for COVID-19 related healthcare services. Please feel free to refer patients with COVID-19 healthcare insurance or billing challenges to our office (via phone at 831-757-5221), or any provider can reach out to me directly for a warm handoff.

I was surprised to hear that some people may be getting bills related to a visit for COVID-19 testing services. From what Sally Tirado and others have shared about their conversations in farmworker communities, it seems word is getting out and cost (or perceived cost) is becoming a barrier to getting tested. Based on what I've been seeing in Federal and State law and policy, I do not believe most people should see any out of pocket cost for COVID-19 testing services. Many of these policies are new and so much has come out in the last month or two. We in the legal aid community are all still learning the ins and outs of how California's COVID-19 healthcare coverage works. I'm sure it's the same at healthcare institutions. I hope we can learn from these situations and work together to help ensure that every Monterey County resident gets the maximum coverage they have a right to, and people don't forgo necessary testing due to cost or perceived cost.

California's COVID-19 website states that "All patients with full-service Medi-Cal or commercial insurance in California will have copays, coinsurance and deductibles waived for COVID-19 testing and screening." This is in line with the the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, as amended by the CARES Act, which requires private insurers to waive an insurance plan member's cost-sharing payments for COVID-19 testing. It is also in line California policy, where all health insurance plans in California are required to cover the entire cost of coronavirus (COVID-19) testing (both diagnostic and antibody tests) and screening. The California Departments of Managed Health Care (DMHC) and Insurance (CDI) both instructed plans that they must cover screening and testing for COVID-19 at no cost to enrollees, and must waive prior authorization requirements for services related to coronavirus testing and screening. Medi-Cal covers testing (including FDA-authorized antibody tests) and emergency treatment (including outside hospitals) for free to all Californians who qualify based on their

income. For those can't qualify for the Medi-Cal coverage they need for COVID-19 related services, <u>a special "presumptive eligibility" program</u> covers testing and treatment for free — regardless of immigration status, resources, income, or other health insurance.

I know implementation of new healthcare coverage policies can be challenging, and there are always unique circumstances. I look forward to getting to the bottom of what might be going on, and where appropriate hope that we can work together to help patients connect to the coverage they need and ensure that cost is not a barrier to getting tested for COVID.

Please let me know if I should contact someone else in your financial teams to invite them to our next coalition meeting, Wednesday May 27 at 5 pm. Some of our undocumented patients are getting bills from the ER's when they go for testing and evaluation with mild COVID-19 symptoms. I hope your financial teams can help us clarify if our Governor's Covid 19 Presumptive Eligibility Coverage or Emergency Medical would cover those expenses. Dr Cuevas and Professor Brenda Eskenazi from UC Berkeley are exploring the possibility to do a large research study in our farmworker community that will include testing with NP swabs, saliva and seroprevalence. Dr Ed Moreno also updated us about the State labs in Salinas and Greenfield (It may take up to 5 days to get results)

Together, safety net clinics and the State labs will help NMC and SVMH to increase testing capacity in this phase of the pandemic.

Thank you for everything you're doing to be there for our community in our time of need! I can't imagine how hard you are all working right now. In spite of all of the challenges we are encountering, it's such a privilege to work alongside you all-- our nation's heroes!

I just wanted to let you all know that CRLA is committed to helping patients access all the healthcare coverage they can get for COVID-19 related healthcare services. Please feel free to refer patients with COVID-19 healthcare insurance or billing challenges to our office (via phone at 831-757-5221), or any provider can reach out to me directly for a warm handoff.

I was surprised to hear that some people may be getting bills related to a visit for COVID-19 testing services. From what Sally Tirado and others have shared about their conversations in farmworker communities, it seems word is getting out and cost (or perceived cost) is becoming a barrier to getting tested. Based on what I've been seeing in Federal and State law and policy, I do not believe most people should see any out of pocket cost for COVID-19 testing services. Many of these policies are new and so much has come out in the last month or two. We in the legal aid community are all still learning the ins and outs of how California's COVID-19 healthcare coverage works. I'm sure it's the same at healthcare institutions. I hope we can learn from these situations and work together to help ensure that every Monterey County resident gets the maximum coverage they have a right to, and people don't forgo necessary testing due to cost or perceived cost.

<u>California's COVID-19 website</u> states that "All patients with full-service Medi-Cal or commercial insurance in California will have copays, coinsurance and deductibles waived for COVID-19 testing and screening." This is in line with the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, as amended by the <u>CARES Act</u>, which requires private insurers to waive an insurance plan member's cost-sharing payments for COVID-19 testing. It is also in

line <u>California policy</u>, where all health insurance plans in California are required to cover the entire cost of coronavirus (COVID-19) testing (both diagnostic <u>and antibody tests</u>) and screening. The California Departments of <u>Managed Health Care</u> (DMHC) and <u>Insurance</u> (CDI) both instructed plans that they must cover screening and testing for COVID-19 at no cost to enrollees, and must waive prior authorization requirements for services related to coronavirus testing and screening. Medi-Cal <u>covers</u> testing (including <u>FDA-authorized antibody tests</u>) and <u>emergency treatment</u> (including outside hospitals) for free to all Californians who qualify based on their income. For those can't qualify for the Medi-Cal coverage they need for COVID-19 related services, <u>a special "presumptive eligibility" program</u> covers testing and treatment for free — regardless of immigration status, resources, income, or other health insurance.

I know implementation of new healthcare coverage policies can be challenging, and there are always unique circumstances. I look forward to getting to the bottom of what might be going on, and where appropriate hope that we can work together to help patients connect to the coverage they need and ensure that cost is not a barrier to getting tested for COVID.

I was surprised to hear that some people may be getting bills related to a visit for COVID-19 testing services. From what Sally Tirado and others have shared about their conversations in farmworker communities, it seems word is getting out and cost (or perceived cost) is becoming a barrier to getting tested. Based on what I've been seeing in Federal and State law and policy, I do not believe most people should see any out of pocket cost for COVID-19 testing services. Many of these policies are new and so much has come out in the last month or two. We in the legal aid community are all still learning the ins and outs of how California's COVID-19 healthcare coverage works. I'm sure it's the same at healthcare institutions. I hope we can learn from these situations and work together to help ensure that every Monterey County resident gets the maximum coverage they have a right to, and people don't forgo necessary testing due to cost or perceived cost.

<u>California's COVID-19 website</u> states that "All patients with full-service Medi-Cal or commercial insurance in California will have copays, coinsurance and deductibles waived for COVID-19 testing and screening." This is in line with the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, as amended by the <u>CARES Act</u>, which requires private insurers to waive an insurance plan member's cost-sharing payments for COVID-19 testing. It is also in

line <u>California policy</u>, where all health insurance plans in California are required to cover the entire cost of coronavirus (COVID-19) testing (both diagnostic <u>and antibody tests</u>) and screening. The California Departments of <u>Managed Health Care</u> (DMHC) and <u>Insurance</u> (CDI) both instructed plans that they must cover screening and testing for COVID-19 at no cost to enrollees, and must waive prior authorization requirements for services related to coronavirus testing and screening. Medi-Cal <u>covers</u> testing (including <u>FDA-authorized antibody tests</u>) and <u>emergency treatment</u> (including outside hospitals) for free to all Californians who qualify based on their income. For those can't qualify for the Medi-Cal coverage they need for COVID-19 related services, <u>a special "presumptive eligibility" program</u> covers testing and treatment for free — regardless of immigration status, resources, income, or other health insurance.

I know implementation of new healthcare coverage policies can be challenging, and there are always unique circumstances. I look forward to getting to the bottom of what might be going on, and where appropriate hope that we can work together to help patients connect to the coverage they need and ensure that cost is not a barrier to getting tested for COVID.

Access to Healthcare (as of 5/17/20)

New CRLA Resource: Check out CRLA's COVID-19 Access to Healthcare in California video, available in <u>Spanish</u> and <u>English</u> (and soon to be dialects of Mixteco and Triqui)!

- 1. All California health insurance plans are required to cover the *entire cost* coronavirus testing, and must provide coverage for treatment too.
 - a. This includes all Medi-Cal plans, even Medi-Cal plans that provide coverage to low-income California residents regardless of immigration status such as restricted-scope ("emergency") Medi-Cal coverage and the new COVID-19 Presumptive Eligibility Program. Even if someone is undocumented, they can still get coverage for the entire cost of testing and emergency treatment until after they are stabilized and no longer need emergency services.
- 2. COVID-19 related services will NOT harm someone's current or future immigration case (The new public charge rule will not consider testing and treatment for coronavirus, even if Medi-Cal pays for the testing and treatment).
- 3. If you do not have any health insurance at all right now, or lose coverage in the future because your work hours are reduced or you get laid off due to

coronavirus, consider applying for a plan through:

- a. Covered California, the marketplace for private health insurance that offers discounted plans;
- b. Medi-Cal, the state's free or low-cost health insurance for low-income Californians;
- c. Medicare, the federal health insurance program for those 65 and over or disabled; or
- d. Federal COBRA and Cal-COBRA programs, which may allow some to people continue their employer-sponsored health care coverage when a job ends or hours are reduced.
- 4. Medi-Cal and Covered California have issued many policy changes to help Californians keep or get coverage. Among them:
 - a. All Medi-Cal redeterminations have been put on hold, meaning those who already have Medi-Cal are not currently at risk of their losing coverage.
 - b. Covered California has opened a new special enrollment period that will last through June for those experiencing job loss or reduced hours due to COVID-19.
- 5. California has created a new "Medi-Nurse" line available for uninsured Californians and Medi-Cal patients without a health plan (fee for service). The line 1-877-409-9052 is available 24/7 for COVID-19 concerns or for general medical issues. I just wanted to let you all know that CRLA is committed to helping patients access all the healthcare coverage they can get for COVID-19 related healthcare services. Please feel free to refer patients with COVID-19 healthcare insurance or billing challenges to our office (via phone at 831-757-5221), or any provider can reach out to me directly for a warm handoff.

I was surprised to hear that some people may be getting bills related to a visit for COVID-19 testing services. From what Sally Tirado and others have shared about their conversations in farmworker communities, it seems word is getting out and cost (or perceived cost) is

becoming a barrier to getting tested. Based on what I've been seeing in Federal and State law and policy, I do not believe most people should see any out of pocket cost for COVID-19 testing services. Many of these policies are new and so much has come out in the last month or two. We in the legal aid community are all still learning the ins and outs of how California's COVID-19 healthcare coverage works. I'm sure it's the same at healthcare institutions. I hope we can learn from these situations and work together to help ensure that every Monterey County resident gets the maximum coverage they have a right to, and people don't forgo necessary testing due to cost or perceived cost.

California's COVID-19 website states that "All patients with full-service Medi-Cal or commercial insurance in California will have copays, coinsurance and deductibles waived for COVID-19 testing and screening." This is in line with the the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, as amended by the <u>CARES Act</u>, which requires private insurers to waive an insurance plan member's cost-sharing payments for COVID-19 testing. It is also in line <u>California policy</u>, where all health insurance plans in California are required to cover the entire cost of coronavirus (COVID-19) testing (both diagnostic and antibody tests) and screening. The California Departments of Managed Health Care (DMHC) and Insurance (CDI) both instructed plans that they must cover screening and testing for COVID-19 at no cost to enrollees, and must waive prior authorization requirements for services related to coronavirus testing and screening. Medi-Cal covers testing (including FDA-authorized antibody tests) and emergency treatment (including outside hospitals) for free to all Californians who qualify based on their income. For those can't qualify for the Medi-Cal coverage they need for COVID-19 related services, a special <u>"presumptive eligibility" program</u> covers testing and treatment for free — regardless of immigration status, resources, income, or other health insurance.

I know implementation of new healthcare coverage policies can be challenging, and there are always unique circumstances. I look forward to getting to the bottom of what might be going on, and where appropriate hope that we can work together to help patients connect to the coverage they need and ensure that cost is not a barrier to getting tested for COVID.

Many of these policies are new and so much has come out in the last month or two. We in the legal aid community are all still learning the ins and outs of how California's COVID-19 healthcare coverage works. I'm sure it's the same at healthcare institutions. I hope we can learn from these situations and work together to help ensure that every Monterey County resident gets the maximum coverage they have a right to, and people don't forgo necessary testing due to cost or perceived cost.

California's COVID-19 website states that "All patients with full-service Medi-Cal or commercial insurance in California will have copays, coinsurance and deductibles waived for COVID-19 testing and screening." This is in line with the the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, as amended by the <u>CARES Act</u>, which requires private insurers to waive an insurance plan member's cost-sharing payments for COVID-19 testing. It is also in line <u>California policy</u>, where all health insurance plans in California are required to cover the entire cost of coronavirus (COVID-19) testing (both diagnostic and antibody tests) and screening. The California Departments of Managed Health Care (DMHC) and Insurance (CDI) both instructed plans that they must cover screening and testing for COVID-19 at no cost to enrollees, and must waive prior authorization requirements for services related to coronavirus testing and screening. Medi-Cal covers testing (including FDA-authorized antibody tests) and emergency treatment (including outside hospitals) for free to all Californians who qualify based on their income. For those can't qualify for the Medi-Cal coverage they need for COVID-19 related services, a special "presumptive eligibility" program covers testing and treatment for free — regardless of immigration status, resources, income, or other health insurance.

I know implementation of new healthcare coverage policies can be challenging, and there are always unique circumstances. I look forward to getting to the bottom of what might be going on, and where appropriate hope that we can work together to help patients connect to the coverage they need and ensure that cost is not a barrier to getting tested for COVID.

I wanted to be sure that you were kept in the loop on the seroprevalence/PCR study. Yesterday we went through IRB at CSVS. We expect we will have to do revisions but that approval will likely be forthcoming in the next couple of weeks. We have enough funding to begin testing and interviewing, although we are continuing to raise money. We intend to test 5000 farmworkers through CSVS. I just got off the phone with your successor at the Fresno county health department, Dr. Vohra, who is coordinating a similar effort with farmworkers there and so I wanted to make sure you were aware of what we are doing since it would likely affect your workload (reporting and contact tracing etc.).

Again I would be happy to discuss this further with you, whenever it is convenient for you.
